With 3 in 4 pupils now using generative AI (up from just 2 in 5 last year!), it's more important than ever for parents and educators to understand the risks.


This week's free guide breaks down the key safety concerns around generative Al tools and offers expert advice for keeping young users safe.

Attendance

Please read the NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance which has further information if you are unsure whether to send your child to school or not. We are always happy to advise in line with this guidance, so if you are still in doubt, please contact the school office if your child develops any symptoms and we can discuss this further with you.



Children can come to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This includes general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above.

Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.

If your child arrives late, it is the responsibility of the adult to report to the school office and sign the "Late Book", giving a reason for lateness. This is important so that the school office knows your child is in school and can mark your child in in the class register. The class registers in the classrooms close at 8.55am when lessons start.

When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office <u>before 9.30am</u> and state clearly reasons for absence. Let's keep working together to ensure attendance is as good as it can be! Remember, <u>every pupil</u>, <u>every day</u>! Thank you for your support. We had an exciting full day of DT, where the children worked in pairs to design a new chair for Baby Bear. Using recyclable materials, they brought their designs to life – and the results were amazing! Year 3




This week, Year 3 have been busy exploring a variety of exciting topics! In English, they focused on key vocabulary from *The Diary of a Fossil Hunter*, expanding their understanding of adventurous storytelling. In Maths, the children delved into the world of 2D and 3D shapes, learning about parallel and perpendicular lines through hands-on activities. French lessons brought fun as they learned about animals and their habitats, practicing new words and phrases. Meanwhile, in Geography, Year 3 discovered the fascinating water cycle and even created their own

mini versions using zip-lock bags to see evaporation and condensation in action. What a fantastic week of learning!

Year 4

This week in Year 4, we've been busy with a variety of exciting activities! In Maths, we explored lines of symmetry, practicing how to identify and draw them. In English, we wrapped up our balanced argument on Banksy, with the children fully presenting their own opinions. Our science lessons focused on deforestation and its environmental impact, sparking passionate discussions about protecting our planet. In Computing, we enjoyed creating interactive games using Scratch, showcasing creativity and coding skills.





Year 5 have impressed us all with their fantastic effort in maths this week, confidently completing an entire unit on negative numbers in just five days! The children quickly grasped the concept and were soon tackling more challenging reasoning problems with enthusiasm and success.

In English, the class have continued their work on life-cycle information texts. Using margin planners and boxed success criteria, they thoughtfully mapped out their writing, focusing on key features to ensure their work is clear, informative, and impactful.

A standout moment this week was Forest School on Monday, where Year 5 spent the day immersed in outdoor learning. They built and





cooked over a real fire, making their own roti from scratch – and of course, enjoying their delicious results! The children also got creative with clay, crafting unique pieces that will be proudly displayed during their upcoming class assembly. They even tried their hand at weaving!

To round off an action-packed week, the class had their first rehearsal for the Brewhouse performance on Thursday. Excitement is building as they prepare to sing their hearts out – we can't wait to see them shine on stage!



Year 6

Well, what a busy and exciting week it's been in Year 6! We started the week with sports day practice during our PE lessons. In maths, we've been applying our fluency skills to a range of problem-solving questions, using everything we've learned so far. ATTENDANCE WHY IT MATTERS



Persistent absence means pupils who miss more than 10% of school every year.



For each additional day of absence between years 7 to 11, the typical pupil could miss out on an average of £750 in future lifetime earnings



Persistently absent pupils in year 10 and 11 could earn £10,000 less on average at age 28, compared to pupils with near perfect attendance

This rises to almost £20k less on average at age 28 for those who are severely absent



For employability over a sustained period, people age 28 were around:



Less likely to be employed when persistently absent



Less likely to be employed when severely absent

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

CENERATIVE AISAFETY

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Generative AI tools – such as ChatGPT – are now commonly used by children. In fact, 3 in 4 pupils in the 2024 Annual Literacy Survey reported using generative AI, up from just 2 in 5 the previous year. While these tools can boost learning and creativity, they also raise concerns around misinformation, privacy and overuse. This guide explores the key risks and how to support safe use.



✓ Real

Generative Al can sometimes produce false or misleading content. Children – and even adults - may assume the information is accurate and trustworthy. This can affect learning and understanding of important topics. It's vital to teach children to critically assess all information, even when it comes from Al.

EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Because generative AI is trained on vast datasets from across the internet, there is a chance it may occasionally generate harmful or inappropriate content. Without supervision, children could encounter disturbing or unsuitable material. Active monitoring and clear usage boundaries can help reduce this risk.

PRIVACY AND DATA **SECURITY**

Some AI tools ask for personal details or store users' interactions. If privacy settings are not correctly configured, children's personal data could be exposed or misused. Teaching good digital hygiene and setting strong privacy controls is essential for protecting children

REDUCED CRITICAL THINKING

Relying too heavily on AI-generated responses may reduce children's willingness to think independently. If they consistently use Al to solve problems or complete tasks, it could impact their ability to reason, analyse and form their own ideas. Encouraging thoughtful reflection is key.

DIGITAL DEPENDENCY

Regular use of generative AI can contribute to increased screen time and less real-world interaction. If left unmanaged, it may affect physical activity levels, sleep, and social development. Striking a healthy balance between online and offline activities is important for wellbeing.

UNCLEAR ETHICAL

Children may not fully understand the ethical implications of using AI to complete homework or creative tasks. This can lead to unintentional plagiarism or dishonest academic practices. Conversations around responsible use and academic honesty are crucial.

Advice for Parents & Educators

NEWS

ESTABLISH CLEAR GUIDELINES

Set clear, age-appropriate rules for when and how generative AI can be used. Reinforce these regularly to help children develop a healthy, respectful and informed relationship with the technology



ENCOURAGE CRITICAL EVALUATION

Help children to question the accuracy of Al-generated information and seek out additional trusted sources. This builds essential digital literacy skills and supports better decision-making.



PROMOTE ACTIVE SUPERVISION

Keep an eye on how the children in your care use Al tools. Check in regularly to ensure they're using them appropriately and be ready to step in if something doesn't feel right.



ENHANCE PRIVACY AWARENESS

Talk to children about the importance of keeping personal information private. Make sure privacy settings are in place and explain how data shared with AI tools could be used.
