#### Story Garden - Summer Reading Challenge 2025

It's that time of year again when we approaching the start of the **Summer Reading Challenge**. This year's Summer Reading Challenge produced by The Reading Agency and delivered in partnership with libraries is Story Garden -Adventures in Nature and the **Great Outdoors**. This exciting new theme will inspire children to tap into a world of imagination through exploring magical reading. the connection between storytelling and nature.



The aim of the Challenge is to help encourage children to read during the summer holidays so that they maintain and improve their reading levels and interest in reading for pleasure. The Summer Reading Challenge can:

- Help to prevent the summer reading 'dip' for pupils.
- Ensure pupils are ready for their return to school in the autumn.
- Support the transition between year groups and key stages.
- Improve language skills, especially for those for whom English is a second language.

The Challenge starts on Saturday 5 July and ends on Monday 15 September.

Children can visit the library to sign up to the Challenge and receive their starter pack. Taking part in the Challenge is completely free. If children cannot visit the library, they can also take part online here <a href="https://www.summerreadingchallenge.org.uk">www.summerreadingchallenge.org.uk</a> and collect virtual badges and prizes. There is a Mini Challenge for 0-4s and the main Challenge for children aged 5-12. Older children are welcome to take part too!

The aim of the Challenge is that children borrow and read 6 books (or as many as they are comfortable to read even if this is less than 6) during the summer holidays. Children will receive stickers and other incentives when they visit the library and, when they complete the Challenge, they will receive a medal and a certificate. Children can borrow any fiction and non-fiction as books or audio books and can also make use of the elibrary to borrow ebooks, e-audio books and e-comics . . .all of which count! Activities will be running in libraries linked to the Challenge during the summer holidays. The majority of these will be free to attend although booking through the library may be required. If children do not have a library card, joining the library is free and they can do it by visiting a library with a parent or carer or their parent / carer can join online <a href="here">here</a>.

This is a fantastic way to support our school's outdoor play initiatives while treating the children to a refreshing snack. Cash only, please. We hope to see you there, thank you for your support!

#### **Sun Safety Advice**

As we approach some very high temperatures over the weekend, which are set to continue into the beginning of next week, we would strongly encourage our families to read the NHS advice on sunscreen and sun safety that can be accessed <a href="here">here</a> to ensure everyone stays safe in the sun. In addition to this, please note additional provisions we have put in place in school which we wanted to make you aware of:



- Children <u>MUST</u> have a suitable container with them in school for water, which is cold and can be freely accessed – children are able to refill their containers at any point during the school day.
- Children MUST come to school with a sunhat.
- Children MUST have sunscreen applied prior to the start of the school day (ideally sunscreen that lasts for 8 hours) and throughout, if required please ensure any suncream is labelled with your child's name and in a suitable carrier/container. The NHS recommends the use of a sunscreen with at least a sun protection factor of 30 or above and at least 4-star UVA (ultraviolet A) protection.
- Children do not have to wear their ties in very hot weather but should be dressed appropriately in accordance with summer uniform expectations loose, light coloured, and comfortable clothing is ideal, i.e. shorts, plain white polo shirts, blue and white checked summer dress etc.
- Teachers and staff will be mindful of extended time outside in unshaded areas or 'hotspots.'
- There will a reduction in physical activity if necessary.
- Classrooms will be kept as cool as possible with blinds down and fans.
- The timings of the school day will be as is the usual timetable, but some break times may be shortened dependent on the heat or will be staggered to ensure children have access to shaded areas.

We hope you find this information useful and that you are able to enjoy this unusually warm weather in a safe way.

From targeted advertising to addictive design, there's more going on behind the scenes than many realise. This week's guide breaks it all down.


Whether its inappropriate content slipping past filters or tech-savvy kids bypassing parental settings, YouTube Kids still needs careful oversight.

#### **Attendance**

Please read the NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance which has further information if you are unsure whether to send your child to school or not. We are always happy to advise in line with this guidance, so if you are still in doubt, please contact the school office if your child develops any symptoms and we can discuss this further with you.



**Children can come to school with mild respiratory illnesses.** This includes general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above.

Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.

If your child arrives late, it is the responsibility of the adult to report to the school office and sign the "Late Book", giving a reason for lateness. This is important so that the school office knows your child is in school and can mark your child in in the class register. The class registers in the classrooms close at 8.55am when lessons start.

When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office <u>before 9.30am</u> and state clearly reasons for absence. Let's keep working together to ensure attendance is as good as it can be! Remember, <u>every pupil</u>, <u>every day</u>! Thank you for your support. This week's Attendance Champions are **Year 1**! #### Nursery

In Nursery Adventures this week...

The Nursery children have been exposed to so many different resources this week, starting with Sports Day on Monday, where they showed great resilience and determination whilst taking part in their physical activities.

Later in the week, they worked together in groups to set up their own obstacle



courses, giving instructions to others on how to navigate them. During this task they demonstrated great teamwork and pulled on all of their experiential knowledge of using PE equipment and resources in the outdoor learning environment.

Inside the classroom, further collaborative learning took place as the children chose a wide range of resources to create and make junk model emergency vehicles. It was fantastic to see so many unique vehicles created, we certainly have great creativity in Nursery!



#### Reception

It has been another sunny, exciting week in Reception full of smiles and laughter!

We have been working hard in our EYFS garden planting more flowers and checking the plants have enough water. Our grass heads are looking very funny now as we have long green hair. We were all very excited when we spotted the sunflowers blooming in the KS1 area, we can't wait to see how tall they get.

Throughout the week we have completed some super activities for our 30 days wild challenge. It was very relaxing laying in the shade on the school field, feeling the gentle breeze and listening to the birds singing.

Wow, we have been super impressed with the efforts everyone is taking to be successful in this challenge – well done Reception!

#### Year 1

We've had a fantastic week in Year 1! English, ln introduced our new writing unit based on The Gingerbread Man. The children enjoyed listening to the story and have begun exploring vocabulary, key helping them build a deeper understanding of the characters events. We're looking and forward to retelling and eventually writing our versions of this classic tale! In Maths, we've been learning all about numbers up to 100. The children have been practising



counting forwards and backwards, identifying one more and one less, and placing numbers accurately on a number line. We've begun exploring the life of the famous explorer Christopher Columbus. The children enjoyed creating a timeline of key events and learning about his voyages and discoveries. This has sparked some brilliant questions and discussions! In Geography, we have been learning to use maps. The children successfully located Burton on a map of the UK and began thinking about where we live in relation to other places. Keep up the hard work Year 1 - well done!



#### Year 2

We've had a fun and busy week in Year 2! Sports Day on Monday was definitely a highlight – the children had a great time taking part in all the events, showing fantastic teamwork and enthusiasm throughout. In English, we've been working hard to write up the neat versions of our postcards, and in Maths we've been practising problem solving using efficient methods to help us feel more confident for our upcoming SATs.

In Computing, the children really enjoyed combining music and tech by creating their own tunes on the computer,

exploring pitch and sounds. We've also had some great discussions in Geography about why some people leave their countries as refugees and why certain continents are more inhabited. In PSHE, we've been thinking about where money comes from and how we use it – lots of brilliant questions and ideas shared. Well done to everyone for another fantastic week!

#### Year 3

This week, Year 3 have been busy exploring exciting topics across the curriculum! In English, the children have been writing descriptive pieces about the famous fossil hunter Mary Anning, using vivid vocabulary to bring her incredible story to life. In Maths, we've been diving into statistics, learning how to read and interpret pictograms and bar charts. Ask your child to show you what they've discovered! Our history lessons have taken us back to the Iron Age, where we investigated farming tools and weapons, comparing how life has changed over





#### Year 4

Collaborating with Year 5 and Year 6 has been a fantastic opportunity, and we are so proud of the enthusiasm and effort our Year 4's are showing during practices. Finally, we had a brilliant time on Sports Day this Monday. The children demonstrated fantastic sportsmanship, teamwork, and determination, representing themselves and our school wonderfully. #### Year 5

# ATTENDANCE WHY IT MATTERS



Persistent absence means pupils who miss more than 10% of school every year.



For each additional day of absence between years 7 to 11, the typical pupil could miss out on an average of £750 in future lifetime earnings



Persistently absent pupils in year 10 and 11 could earn £10,000 less on average at age 28, compared to pupils with near perfect attendance

This rises to almost £20k less on average at age 28 for those who are severely absent



For employability over a sustained period, people age 28 were around:



Less likely to be employed when persistently absent



Less likely to be employed when severely absent

\*Compared to their peers with near perfect attendance
