What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Nintendo launched its Switch 2 games console in early June 2025 – its first new console in eight years. While it builds on the original's success by remaining compatible with certain existing games, it also adds powerful hardware and new features like GameChat and a USB-C camera. As more children look to upgrade, it's important to understand how this new console might affect their play and safety.

EASIER TO ACCESS MATURE CONTENT

Despite Nintendo's reputation for family-friendly titles, mature games like Cyberpunk 2077 and Hitman have been released onto the platform. With the Switch 2's improved performance, developers will be able to port even more mature-rated games. These may appeal to children due to their popularity, but they contain content that is highly unsuitable for young

IN-APP & GAME STORE PURCHASES

The Nintendo eShop enables purchases with just a few taps. If payment details are saved and PIN protection is disabled, children may unknowingly make costly purchases including game add-ons, cosmetic items or entire new releases – without parental approval.

UNRESTRICTED ONLINE PLAY IN SOME GAMES

While GameChat is one feature, Switch 2 also connects to the broader Nintendo Switch Online service. Many free-to-play titles like Fortnite or Splatoon 4 allow voice or text chat with strangers unless chat settings are adjusted, meaning children could encounter inappropriate language or unwanted contact.

GAMECHAT & REAL-TIME VOICE COMMUNICATION

GameChat enables live chatting with up to 12 people, even across different games, with optional video and screen-sharing. Though children under 16 are restricted to chatting only with approved friends, the sheer interactivity could raise privacy concerns or create pressure to remain online longer.

CAMERA COMPATIBILITY & PRIVACY CONCERNS

The optional USB-C camera supports video calling and facial overlays in games; however, this also raises the risk of cyberbullying or the unwanted sharing of personal images. The camera can be disabled, removed or covered, and parental controls are essential to manage how and when it is used.

POWERFUL PULL OF FAMILIAR CHARACTERS



Nintendo's mascot, Mario - along with Pikachu, Donkey Kong and others – remains hugely appealing to younger audiences, especially after the success of the recent film, 'The Super Mario Bros. Movie' (2023). These beloved icons are central to Nintendo's branding and often feature in merchandising, adverts and in-game promotions, creating strong emotional attachments in children and a sense of urgency to keep up with their peers.

Advice for Parents & Educators

CHECK RATINGS & USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Every Switch and Switch 2 game comes with a PEGI age rating. Before buying one, ensure the content matches your child's age. Use the Nintendo Parental Controls app to monitor gameplay, set screen-time limits and manage friend requests.

REMOVE OR RESTRICT PAYMENT METHODS

Avoid accidental spending by unlinking credit cards from the device. Instead, consider adding funds via prepaid eShop cards or requiring a PIN for purchases. Some banking apps can also be set to approve transactions manually.

Meet Our Expert

REVIEW FRIEND LISTS AND CHAT PERMISSIONS

Child profiles are restricted to chatting with approved friends only, but it's good practice to regularly check their friend list and communication settings. Use the Parental Controls app to switch off voice or video chat if necessary.

ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATIONS

Teach children how to block, report and capture any behaviour or content that makes them uncomfortable. The console's built-in tools allow them to create screenshots and video clips, which can aid in reporting any issues. Keeping an open dialogue helps children feel supported and safe.



Story Garden - Summer Reading Challenge 2025

It's that time of year again when we approaching the start of the **Summer Reading Challenge**. This year's Summer Reading Challenge produced by The Reading Agency and delivered in partnership with libraries is Story Garden -Adventures in Nature and the **Great Outdoors**. This exciting new theme will inspire children to tap into a world of imagination through exploring magical reading. the connection between storytelling and nature.



The aim of the Challenge is to help encourage children to read during the summer holidays so that they maintain and improve their reading levels and interest in reading for pleasure. The Summer Reading Challenge can:

- Help to prevent the summer reading 'dip' for pupils.
- Ensure pupils are ready for their return to school in the autumn.
- Support the transition between year groups and key stages.
- Improve language skills, especially for those for whom English is a second language.

The Challenge starts on Saturday 5 July and ends on Monday 15 September.

Children can visit the library to sign up to the Challenge and receive their starter pack. Taking part in the Challenge is completely free. If children cannot visit the library, they can also take part online here www.summerreadingchallenge.org.uk and collect virtual badges and prizes. There is a Mini Challenge for 0-4s and the main Challenge for children aged 5-12. Older children are welcome to take part too!

The aim of the Challenge is that children borrow and read 6 books (or as many as they are comfortable to read even if this is less than 6) during the summer holidays. Children will receive stickers and other incentives when they visit the library and, when they complete the Challenge, they will receive a medal and a certificate. Children can borrow any fiction and non-fiction as books or audio books and can also make use of the elibrary to borrow ebooks, e-audio books and e-comics . . .all of which count! Activities will be running in libraries linked to the Challenge during the summer holidays. The majority of these will be free to attend although booking through the library may be required. If children do not have a library card, joining the library is free and they can do it by visiting a library with a parent or carer or their parent / carer can join online here.

Sun Safety Advice

As we approach some very high temperatures over the weekend, which are set to continue into the beginning of next week, we would strongly encourage our families to read the NHS advice on sunscreen and sun safety that can be accessed here to ensure everyone stays safe in the sun. In addition to this, please note additional provisions we have put in place in school which we wanted to make you aware of:



- Children <u>MUST</u> have a suitable container with them in school for water, which is cold and can be freely accessed children are able to refill their containers at any point during the school day.
- Children MUST come to school with a sunhat.
- Children MUST have sunscreen applied prior to the start of the school day (ideally sunscreen that lasts for 8 hours) and throughout, if required please ensure any suncream is labelled with your child's name and in a suitable carrier/container. The NHS recommends the use of a sunscreen with at least a sun protection factor of 30 or above and at least 4-star UVA (ultraviolet A) protection.
- Children do not have to wear their ties in very hot weather but should be dressed appropriately in accordance with summer uniform expectations loose, light coloured, and comfortable clothing is ideal, i.e. shorts, plain white polo shirts, blue and white checked summer dress etc.
- Teachers and staff will be mindful of extended time outside in unshaded areas or 'hotspots.'
- There will a reduction in physical activity if necessary.
- Classrooms will be kept as cool as possible with blinds down and fans.
- The timings of the school day will be as is the usual timetable, but some break times may be shortened dependent on the heat or will be staggered to ensure children have access to shaded areas.

We hope you find this information useful and that you are able to enjoy this unusually warm weather in a safe way.


From the arrival of real-time GameChat and a plug-in camera to an easier path to mature content and in-app spending, there's a lot to consider.

Attendance

Please read the NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance which has further information if you are unsure whether to send your child to school or not. We are always happy to advise in line with this guidance, so if you are still in doubt, please contact the school office if your child develops any symptoms and we can discuss this further with you.



Children can come to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This includes general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above.

Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.

If your child arrives late, it is the responsibility of the adult to report to the school office and sign the "Late Book", giving a reason for lateness. This is important so that the school office knows your child is in school and can mark your child in in the class register. The class registers in the classrooms close at 8.55am when lessons start.

When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office <u>before 9.30am</u> and state clearly reasons for absence. Let's keep working together to ensure attendance is as good as it can be! Remember, <u>every pupil</u>, <u>every day!</u> Thank you for your support. Nursery

In Nursery Adventures this week...

We have had a wonderful week talking about real life superhero's who work in the Emergency Services to help us. The children have enjoyed learning all about the police and the fire service. They have loved taking part in a range of adventures being firemen and policemen/lady.

Later on in the week the children continued to take on the role of police and used their imaginations to create wanted posters for the bad guys who were stealing sweets, people's



wallets and not following the law. There were some super discussions by the children using wonderful vocabulary!

Reception

We have had lots of fun searching for minibeasts this week as we completed the last week of our 30 days wild challenge! The most popular was the ladybird, Dawoud even found a 'poisonous' black and orange one.

During maths we have practiced our grouping skills using gingerbread men and animals. We have used our vocabulary brilliantly to discuss our adventures including, 'share,' 'unfair,' 'equal,' 'double,' and 'groups.'

We completed some super I spy challenges finding hidden objects and using our phonics knowledge to write about them.

It has been great carrying out our learning outdoors, making the most of the glorious weather and showing our gratitude to nature.

Year 1

What a fantastic week we've had! In maths, we've been busy recognising different coins and notes, and practising how to count money accurately. The children have enjoyed using real coins to help develop their understanding of value and making totals. In English, we've been exploring adjectives to describe the gingerbread man. The children came up with some wonderfully imaginative words and wrote lovely descriptive sentences. Our music lessons have focused on the song *Nautilus*. We've been listening carefully and learning about tone and pitch, discovering how music can make us feel and how sounds can change. In computing, we have been learning how to type and explore different fonts. The children are becoming more confident in using the keyboard and expressing their creativity through text formatting. In science, we have been learning all about the lifecycle of plants. From seed to flower, the children enjoyed exploring each stage and making their own plant life-cycle diagrams! A great week – well done, Year 1!

Year 2

We've had a brilliant week in Year 2! In English, the children have been busy writing up their final pieces, and we're so impressed with the creativity, focus, and pride they've shown in their work. In Maths, we've started looking at Statistics, including tally charts, bar charts, and pictograms. The children have really enjoyed this practical learning and are doing so well with it.

We've also been getting ready for our SATS next week by practising in a calm and supportive way, learning useful techniques to help us feel confident and do our best. The children have approached this with such a positive attitude, and we're so proud of their effort and resilience. We know they're going to absolutely smash it next week! Thank you for your continued support and encouragement at home.



Year 3

This week, Year 3 have been busy with a fantastic range of learning activities! In English, the children have been planning and drafting the beginnings of their diary entries in role as Mary Anning, bringing the famous fossil hunter's story to life through imaginative writing. In Maths, they've been recapping key learning from across the year, strengthening their understanding and celebrating how much they've grown. Music has been especially lively! The class has been learning to play

the glockenspiel using the notes C, D, and E, focusing on playing with different durations. They've al so taken a musical trip to Brazil, exploring the rhythms of the Rio de Janeiro carnival and having great fun using drums to recreate some of the exciting beats.

Year 4

This week, Year 4 has been full exciting activities and incredible achievements! In Maths and Reading, we conducted our termly assessments, and it has been so rewarding to see the progress the children have made. Their hard work and dedication throughout the term are shining through! In Art, the children have been busy tracing their agua and oil pastel drawings, creating some



stunning pieces. Their creativity and attention to detail have been fantastic to see. On Thursday, we held our fantastic class assembly, where the children showcased their learning about the Ancient Egyptians. It was wonderful to see them confidently share their knowledge and enthusiasm with parents. The highlight for many was the chance to view the incredible extended projects that the children had created, it was clear that a lot of thought and effort had gone into them. A huge well done to Year 4 for a great week of learning and creativity!

Year 5

This week, Year 5 have had a busy and thought-provoking time of learning. In Maths, the children have been developing their understanding of measurement by converting between different units, including grams and kilograms, millilitres and litres. In Science, they explored the fascinating structure of eggs, learning about the



different parts inside and their functions. On Wednesday afternoon, we welcomed PCSO Leon Worden, who led an important session on respect, the criminal age of responsibility, and the dangers of bladed articles. He gave strong advice about staying safe — emphasising the importance of walking away from dangerous situations rather than trying to deal with them alone. On Thursday, the Mental Health Support Team visited to deliver an insightful workshop on social media. The children learned how to stay safe online, identify potential dangers, and reflect on how social media can affect our mental health. It's been a week full of valuable life lessons alongside our academic learning.

Year 6

What a fantastic week we've had in Year 6! On Monday, we were introduced to micro:bits in computing. These are tiny computers we can program ourselves. We explored their components, tested our code using an emulator, and successfully transferred our programs to the devices. On Tuesday, we had a brilliant day at Forest School, including a nature walk up to Sinai House. Mrs Johnston led a detailed session on identifying trees, which we compared to those in our Forest School area. We also made elder jewellery and practised whittling using sheath knives. On Wednesday, we had a visit from the PCSO, who gave an informative talk on how to stay safe in the community. We ended the week working hard on our Brewhouse production and Leavers' Assembly rehearsals. Well done, Year 6!

ATTENDANCE WHY IT MATTERS



Persistent absence means pupils who miss more than 10% of school every year.



For each additional day of absence between years 7 to 11, the typical pupil could miss out on an average of £750 in future lifetime earnings



Persistently absent pupils in year 10 and 11 could earn £10,000 less on average at age 28, compared to pupils with near perfect attendance

This rises to almost £20k less on average at age 28 for those who are severely absent

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Nintendo launched its Switch 2 games console in early June 2025 – its first new console in eight years. While it builds on the original's success by remaining compatible with certain existing games, it also adds powerful hardware and new features like GameChat and a USB-C camera. As more children look to upgrade, it's important to understand how this new console might affect their play and safety.

EASIER TO ACCESS MATURE CONTENT

Despite Nintendo's reputation for family-friendly titles, mature games like Cyberpunk 2077 and Hitman have been released onto the platform. With the Switch 2's improved performance, developers will be able to port even more mature-rated games. These may appeal to children due to their popularity, but they contain content that is highly unsuitable for young

IN-APP & GAME STORE PURCHASES

The Nintendo eShop enables purchases with just a few taps. If payment details are saved and PIN protection is disabled, children may unknowingly make costly purchases including game add-ons, cosmetic items or entire new releases – without parental approval.

UNRESTRICTED ONLINE PLAY IN SOME GAMES

While GameChat is one feature, Switch 2 also connects to the broader Nintendo Switch Online service. Many free-to-play titles like Fortnite or Splatoon 4 allow voice or text chat with strangers unless chat settings are adjusted, meaning children could encounter inappropriate language or unwanted contact.

GAMECHAT & REAL-TIME VOICE COMMUNICATION

GameChat enables live chatting with up to 12 people, even across different games, with optional video and screen-sharing. Though children under 16 are restricted to chatting only with approved friends, the sheer interactivity could raise privacy concerns or create pressure to remain online longer.

CAMERA COMPATIBILITY & PRIVACY CONCERNS

The optional USB-C camera supports video calling and facial overlays in games; however, this also raises the risk of cyberbullying or the unwanted sharing of personal images. The camera can be disabled, removed or covered, and parental controls are essential to manage how and when it is used.

POWERFUL PULL OF FAMILIAR CHARACTERS



Nintendo's mascot, Mario - along with Pikachu, Donkey Kong and others – remains hugely appealing to younger audiences, especially after the success of the recent film, 'The Super Mario Bros. Movie' (2023). These beloved icons are central to Nintendo's branding and often feature in merchandising, adverts and in-game promotions, creating strong emotional attachments in children and a sense of urgency to keep up with their peers.

Advice for Parents & Educators

CHECK RATINGS & USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Every Switch and Switch 2 game comes with a PEGI age rating. Before buying one, ensure the content matches your child's age. Use the Nintendo Parental Controls app to monitor gameplay, set screen-time limits and manage friend requests.

REMOVE OR RESTRICT PAYMENT METHODS

Avoid accidental spending by unlinking credit cards from the device. Instead, consider adding funds via prepaid eShop cards or requiring a PIN for purchases. Some banking apps can also be set to approve transactions manually.

REVIEW FRIEND LISTS AND CHAT PERMISSIONS


Child profiles are restricted to chatting with approved friends only, but it's good practice to regularly check their friend list and communication settings. Use the Parental Controls app to switch off voice or video chat if necessary.

ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATIONS

Teach children how to block, report and capture any behaviour or content that makes them uncomfortable. The console's built-in tools allow them to create screenshots and video clips, which can aid in reporting any issues. Keeping an open dialogue helps children feel supported and safe.
