Dear Parents/Carers.

Things are starting to look and feel very festive around school! The Christmas tree and decorations will be going up shortly, nativity rehearsals are in full swing, and the Christmas Market will soon be entertaining visitors! The Christmas holidays seem to be racing quickly towards us and there is still so much to do! Please keep checking the diary dates at the end of the newsletter to remind yourselves of what is happening.

I know the children are really looking forward to their stay and it promises to be a fantastic few days for them! Year 2 also have their class assembly on Thursday 27 November at 9.00am, and we hope to see as many of our parents in attendance as possible!



It has started to feel exceptionally cold this week so we would like to take this opportunity again to remind all of our families about the school's procedures should we receive substantial snowfall and extreme weathers. The school will endeavour to remain open in the first instance and closing the school will only ever be chosen in the final instance. Please can I ask that you do not contact the school office asking if we are open, as we will always use our main methods of communication in the event of such a decision. You will all receive a text message, and the school Instagram @shobnallprimary page will also be used to

state that this decision has been made. Please ensure that the school office has up-to-date contact details for you. We hope that we are not required to close but such a decision must take into consideration many factors, not just the amount of snow on the school grounds. For example, the safety of parents and families on their journey to school, the staff and their journey to school (many of whom travel some considerable distances through remote areas) and, of course, the weather forecast, and Met Office advice all play a part. I hope that this clarifies our procedures for you and many thanks for your understanding in this matter.

Keep Well This Winter

We see cases of flu, RSV, COVID-19 and norovirus throughout the year, but in winter they circulate at the same time and can reach high levels. The NHS have produced some great advice to help us avoid catching a winter bug and protect our health.



- Get vaccinated Everyone who is eligible, especially the elderly, pregnant women, and those with
 pre-existing health conditions, are encouraged to come forward for their vaccinations for these
 infections.
- Keep washing your hands Regularly washing your hands with soap and warm water for 20 seconds and using bleach-based products to clean surfaces are effective ways to stop the spread of norovirus and other infections. Avoid preparing food for others if you have diarrhoea and or vomiting.
- Practice self-care Getting plenty of rest, drinking lots of water, and taking over-the-counter medications are often effective ways to deal with common minor illnesses like colds, sore throats or coughs.
- Use antibiotics responsibly Antibiotics do not work against viruses, which are the usual cause of
 these conditions. Taking antibiotics when you don't need them can contribute to antibiotic resistance,
 making it harder to treat bacterial infections in the future, so always listen to your doctor, nurse or
 pharmacist's advice.
- Protect yourself against cold weather Maintain indoor temperatures of at least 18°C, particularly
 if you are older or live with elderly people, young children, or those with long-term health conditions.
 If you're spending time outdoors, ensure you wear plenty of warm clothing.

Equipment:


- Orange

- 4. Place your candle in the hole that your teacher has made at the top of the orange.

Safety Tip!



Attendance

Please read the NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance which has further information if you are unsure whether to send your child to school or not. We are always happy to advise in line with this guidance, so if you are still in doubt, please contact the school office if your child develops any symptoms and we can discuss this further with you. **Children can come to school with mild respiratory illnesses.** This includes general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above. Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.

If your child arrives late, it is the responsibility of the adult to report to the school office and sign the "Late Book", giving a reason for lateness. This is important so that the school office knows your child is in school and can mark your child in in the class register. The class registers in the classrooms close at 8.55am when lessons start. When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office before 9.30am and state clearly reasons for absence.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

This week we have had an amazing adventure exploring colour.

We had a special delivery on Monday when a new book arrived wrapped in layers of colourful paper. After lots of unwrapping we were excited to find the story, 'The Dinosaur that Popped a Rainbow' by Tom Fletcher. We were so excited to share this story and learn all about colours. We also thought it was very funny when the colour brown was added!

The colour theme continued as we explored the artwork of Jackson Pollock. After lots of discussion it was our turn to become artists and using inspiration from this brilliant artist we created our own masterpieces.

Our colour adventures continued and included mixing colours using surprise dinosaur splats, subitising pipe cleaner rainbows and using a variety of construction resources to create our own rainbows.

To finish off the week we created our own happy breathing tools to help us feel calm when we get red. We transformed boring plain cardboard tubes into magnificent rainbow breathing creations. Watching the strips of paper make a rainbow as we breath out is a fantastic way for us to return to green.

Reception

What a magical week it's been in Reception! We've kicked off our new theme, "Sparkle and Shine," with an amazing surprise – our very own Ice Castle! The children have loved exploring this frosty wonderland and have been busy building their own castles using lots of different construction materials.

They've also designed clever vehicles to transport ice to the palace and carried out exciting investigations to discover how ice melts. In art, the children have wowed us with their portrait skills, learning how to create eyes and noses using a variety of media.

And in Drawing Club, the story of *"The Magic Porridge Pot"* has inspired plenty of creativity and imagination. What a fantastic week Reception!

Year 1

Year 1 have had a fantastic week of learning! We've been working hard on writing our own sentences using imperative verbs, and Miss Barker is so impressed with how carefully everyone remembered their finger spaces and full stops. In maths, we've been learning to use part-whole models to show subtraction, which really helped us understand how numbers fit together. In science, we explored the different seasons and even designed our own hibernation dens for animals – such creative ideas! On Wednesday, we had a magical trip to the cinema to watch "The Wild Robot." The children behaved exemplarily and made Miss Barker, Ms Walton and Mrs Robina so proud. They loved the popcorn and chocolate too – what a treat! To finish off the week, we've started learning the songs for our Nativity and practicing our lines. We can't wait to share it with you soon!

Year 2


This week in Year 2, the children have been working hard in Maths, focusing on subtraction, missing-number problems, and comparing number sentences. In English, we have been learning all about the Royal Family through reading and writing activities. In Science, we have been exploring healthy eating, discussing the right foods to choose and why they are important for our bodies. We also enjoyed a wonderful trip to the cinema to watch The Wild Robot, which the children absolutely loved. In addition, we are busy preparing for our Great Fire of London assembly and can't wait to showcase all the children's hard work to you next week.



Year 3

What a brilliant week we've had in year 3. Despite the cold temperatures, the learning in the classroom has been the opposite! The children have made a fantastic start to the new Multiplication and Division unit in Maths. They've been working really hard and I've been so impressed. In English, we have finished writing our persuasive reports about why people should visit Skara Brae. The children have worked so hard perfecting their writing and it's been lovely to see. In History, the children practiced being historians! We compared primary and secondary sources and the benefits of both. We've also started to ramp up our rehearsals for our nativity - Lights Camel Action 2: The Sequin. The children have impressed with their singing, and some children are even off script! Well done year 3 - keep it up!

Year 4



Year 4 have had a fantastic and action-packed week! We began at Forest School, where the children learned how to use bow saws safely to cut wood and practised striking flint and steel to create sparks – great teamwork and resilience on show. On Tuesday, we completed our Design Technology unit by making our very own slingshot cars. The class built their chassis using lollipop sticks, dowels and wooden wheels before designing bold, colourful car bodies inspired by the De Stijl art movement. After assembling the final models, we raced them to investigate what made some cars travel faster than others. In Maths, we focused on the 6 and 9 multiplication and division facts, while in RE we began our new Christianity unit, exploring the importance of symbols. Science saw us learning about different types of teeth and their specific jobs. In English, we worked with fronted adverbials and created our own imaginative battle animals to prepare for

writing diary entries as if we were Hannibal crossing the Alps during the Punic War. I can't wait to read their incredible diary entries next week!

Year 5

In Maths, the children have been learning how to add fractions with different denominators. They have practised finding common denominators and using their times-table knowledge to add fractions accurately. In English, the children have begun writing and editing their alien stories. They have been focusing on using powerful verbs to make their writing more vivid and engaging. It has been wonderful to see their imagination develop as they create their characters and settings.

In Science, we have explored reversible changes, thinking about which materials can return to their original state. The children have also been working hard on improving their scientific writing by using the PEEL paragraph method to structure clear predictions and thoughtful conclusions.



Year 6

This week in Maths, the children been developing have understanding of measurement. They have been learning how to convert between different units, including millimetres, centimetres, metres and kilometres, and have been applying these skills to a range of problem-solving activities. In English, we have continued working on our Amazon Rainforest narratives. The children have written the introduction and buildup to their stories, focusing on rich description and effective atmosphere. They also spent time

editing and improving their drafts, thinking carefully about vocabulary, punctuation and sentence structure. During PE, we have been exploring a variety of *passing techniques*. The children practised accuracy, control and teamwork as they learned when and how to use different types of passes in game situations. In Computing, Year 6 have begun learning about *website design*. They explored the key features of effective websites and started planning the layout and content for their own web pages. Overall, the children have worked incredibly hard and shown great enthusiasm across all subjects. Well done, Year 6!
